PROCEEDINGS 1 2 THE CHAIRPERSON: Let's call the meeting 3 to order. 4 I want to thank you all for coming today and to tell you how glad I am to see everyone. 5 As you know we are governed by the Open 6 7 Meetings Act, so we are going to try to avoid 8 multiple conversations because Ann can't keep track 9 of them, and it doesn't help out with the 10 transparency in government that we are trying to get 11 by the Open Meetings Act. So if you have something to say, raise 12 13 your hand or put your card on end which might be 14 easier for me to keep track of. 15 What we are going to do today is the DNR 16 staff will brief us on the topic. If anybody else has any comments, citizens if we have any today, 17 18 they can raise their hand and let us know and then 19 we will have a conversation during a deliberative 20 session and make a motion and come up with a recommendation if there is any actions to be taken 21

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1 today. 2 So I ask you to stick with that so we can make sure she gets what she needs from us and that 3 4 we all have the benefit of one another's conversations. And please use the microphones so 5 it's easier for us to record the meeting. 6 7 I want to just take a moment to 8 acknowledge and welcome our new member, Joe Hellner. Welcome aboard. He will be introducing himself 9 10 when we go around with the introductions for our 11 group, and we are very glad to have you here today. I would like to take a moment of silence. 12 13 One of the long-time boating members, Bill 14 Weintraub, passed away in November, and I'm sure 15 many of you remember him. So just for a moment maybe we can reflect on his contributions to us and 16 17 send the wishes that we want to his family and for 18 him. 19 (Pause in the proceedings.) 20 THE CHAIRPERSON: Thank you all. So now let's do introductions and let's 21

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start with Captain Chris.
MR. PARLIN: Good morning. Chris Parlin.
Resident of Centreville, representing boaters at
large.
TOM MASTERS: Tom Masters. Coast Guard,
hunter, and a fire boat captain.
MR. LEVITAN: Fred Levitan. Past
commodore, Chesapeake Bay Yacht Club Association.
Twenty-eight year member here representing boaters
at large.
MR. HELLNER: Hi. I'm Joe Hellner. I'm
your new guy so a little bit of background on me.
Been a recreational boater in the Chesapeake North
Bay area in particular for the last nearly 30 years
and very active in the yacht club yachting
community.
Fred mentioned he was a past commodore of
CVYCA. So am I. I'm also past commodore of the
Yacht Clubs of Maryland, and twice past commodore of
the Belvedere Yacht Club.
I am a member of the Baltimore Yacht Club.

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1	I am a sailor and a power boater. I like them all,
2	so some people might call me a bi-boater but that's
3	okay.
4	I love boats from kayaks all the way on up
5	to big cruisers, cruise ships, whatever. Like many
6	of you all here I am sure, I share a deep passion
7	about the Chesapeake Bay and recreational boating
8	and doing whatever I can to ensure we have the most
9	enjoyment of our precious resource, our Chesapeake
10	Bay, and from the recreational boating standpoint as
11	we possibly can balancing the needs of the citizens
12	of the state of Maryland.
13	So it is absolutely my pleasure to be here
14	with you all, and I look forward to working with
15	you.
16	MR. PEPE: John Pepe. Lifelong resident of
17	the Eastern Shore. I hold a 200-ton master's
18	license, and I'm a full-time marine surveyor.
19	MR. SHELLER: Jon Sheller, Rock Hall Creek
20	Marina, Deale, Maryland. Famous Deale, Maryland.
21	Retired Navy captain, jack-of-all trades and master

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1 of none. 2 MR. JONES: Thornell Jones. Coast Guard Auxillary. I have been teaching advanced coastal 3 4 navigation for over 20 years. I'm a sailor and belong to the Eastport Yacht Club and have been on 5 the committee for a long time. 6 7 MR. SIMON: Al Simon. Member at large. Past commodore, CBYCA, and also Selby Bay Yacht Club 8 still. One of the originals from the Coast Guard's 9 10 boat safety advisory counsel and I'm here. 11 MR. DWYER: Russ Dwyer. I own a waterfront farm outside of St. Michaels. I'm a licensed master 12 13 plumber. I'm a licensed waterman. I'm a licensed 14 quide; hunting quide. 15 MR. NICKEL: Bob Nickel from Garrett 16 County, Maryland, up there in the great white north on Deep Creek Lake. I do say great white north 17 18 because I woke up to snow again this morning. 19 General manager of a dealership that has 20 been on the lake up there for 56 years, Bill's Marine Service. Obviously boaters at large and I am an avid 21

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boater myself. 1 2 MR. BUSH: John Bush and as usual I'm glad to be anyplace. I am a past chairman of the board 3 4 here and also a past captain with the Coast Guard 5 auxillary. MR. McSWEEN: Edric McSween. I am a 6 7 recreational power boater, and I live in Annapolis right off the South River. 8 9 MR. KLING: Steve Kling and I have been on 10 this committee for a while, and I'm the one who owns and races a sail boat. 11 MR. LUNSFORD: I'm Bob Lunsford and I'm the 12 13 resident trailer boater. If there is a place with a 14 launch ramp you are likely to find me there. 15 MR. MARSH: I'm Coles Marsh and am past 16 chairman of the committee, and we have a lot of CBYCA folks around here. I past commodore of the CBYCA so 17 the yacht club community is certainly well 18 19 represented on this committee. I enjoy my 20 association with the committee. MS. CRAIG: Amy Craig from Upper Marlboro 21

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1	and I evidently represent the water skiers and the
2	families with kids learning to water ski and taking
3	up all the space on the quiet spots. My son is a
4	white boarder.
5	MS. TROVATO: I am Ramona Trovato,
6	boater-at-large. I live on the Severn River and have
7	a waterfront home there.
8	I have a lot of little sail boats, kayaks,
9	all the little stuff, and grew up here in Maryland
10	and just love it. I am honored to be a part of this
11	committee and to serve with all of you.
12	MR. GRANT: Hi. Mike Grant. Boat Act
13	Advisory Committee to the Department of National
14	Resources secretary. I'm here because I love it
15	here.
16	THE CHAIRPERSON: Jeannine, do you want to
17	say hi and introduce yourself.
18	MS. MOANEY: Hi. Jeannine Moaney.
19	MR. WYNER: Morning. Marty Wyner. Past
20	commodore, Maryland Yacht Club in 1988 and a past
21	commodore of the Yacht Clubs Association in 1995.

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1	MS. EISENHAUER: Hello. Rachel
2	Eisenhauer. I'm an assistant attorney general with
3	the Department of Natural Resources.
4	MR. TALTY: Good morning. Mark Talty. I
5	am also an assistant attorney general with the
6	Department of Natural Resources.
7	MR. ELLIS: I'm Reed Ellis and I am
8	Ramona's director of maintenance. I'm sorry.
9	Commodore Ramona because we do have multiple boats
10	it is commodore.
11	MS. WILLIAMS: Ann Williams. Maryland
12	Department of Natural Resources, boating services.
13	MS. DAWES: Sara Dawes. Maryland
14	Department of Natural Resources, boating services.
15	MR. WRIGHT: Louis Wright, boating
16	services.
17	THE CHAIRPERSON: Once again, welcome
18	everybody. I think we are ready to turn it over to
19	you, Mike.
20	MR. GRANT: In order of the agenda, we
21	have nothing for 2015. No regulations yet. If any
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1	came in after discussions, it turned out to be
2	either a current regulatory issue or an enforcement
3	issue, I meant to say, or people did not understand
4	the unintended consequences of their request and
5	decided not to go forward with the request.
6	For 2014, starting right off with JetPack
7	regulations, currently on hold until January at the
8	earliest. The emergency regulation expires on
9	December 23, but because we have some other issues
10	popping in, one actually was just solved yesterday.
11	The Coast Guard was reviewing its
12	definition of a vessel and whether its JetPack
13	actually fit in there. As of yesterday they
14	determined it is a vessel. It's basically a jet ski
15	and it will never ever change. It will be a vessel.
16	So if they had decided otherwise, we would
17	have had a heck of a time reviewing their regulations
18	adjusting for that.
19	In June the U.S. Coast Guard sent the five
20	livery operators a letter stating the operators of a
21	transport vessel must obtain a Six Pack license.

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1	I think we all kind of knew that. What we
2	didn't know was there were two more livery operators
3	both on the South River.
4	Other employees must enroll in the chemical
5	treatment program on a regular basis. Everybody but
6	the person answering the phone. Anybody that is
7	involved in the water or use of the product has to
8	take the test.
9	This includes, which I thought was kind of
10	interesting, the person who stands on a dock with the
11	remote control and handles it. That person has to
12	have a Six Pack license. So that is new.
13	But there is something else that came up.
14	Ann?
15	MS. WILLIAMS: The actual Coast Guard
16	letter doesn't clearly state the guy the rusters
17	as we call them in our definition have to have a
18	Six Pack, and that was because when they wrote the
19	letter to them the decision whether or not a JetPack
20	was a vessel had not been fully formed.
21	So they sent out this letter to the five

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2	just telling us recap and revisit that because of
}	our regulation requiring all renters to be run by a
•	business owner person in the organization that owns
5	the company, that that person must have a Six Pack
	also because they're now running a vessel, which is
,	the JetPack.
}	But if it had not been called a vessel,
)	that person would not have had to have a Six Pack, so
)	there would be another letter going, but this letter
•	right now only the person that transports, so
}	remember the people that put them on a barge to an
5	actual site and then fled, that guy who ran the
	pontoon boat would have had to have a Six Pack.
5	Everybody else would just have to have the
5	drug test by the letter that was already sent. So
,	they're going to modify that. That's the key point
}	that came out yesterday and they're going to fix
)	that.
)	MR. GRANT: The next issue was the
	exception section. This is currently in the

known companies, and they're going to -- Julie was

1	regulation. This is also elsewhere in COMAR, but
2	this, Mark, our attorney general, took a look at this
3	section.
4	We had some concerns over whether or not
5	this would be the person who got the exception would
6	think that everything was an exception speed
7	limits, all that kind of stuff so we are going to
8	look into that kind of stuff and maybe Mark could
9	expand on this a little bit.
10	MR. TALTY: Sure. As Mike had said, going
11	through revisiting the emergency regulations, we came
12	back and kind of combed over this language, which as
13	Mike mentioned, is in PWC regulation and also in the
14	general boating regulation.
15	The issue that we had with it is under
16	section B there. It says if approved by the
17	Department of Natural Resources or the U.S. Coast
18	Guard JetPack also engaged in any one of these
19	things.
20	So the way it is written now currently
21	there is no mechanism or process by which someone

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1	could seek one of these through the Department. The
2	way that it has been going on to our understanding is
3	that people engage in these things go to the Coast
4	Guard to get a marine event permit. The Coast Guard
5	issues a marine event permit.
6	In the way that this is written currently
7	once they receive that permit, they are then excepted
8	from every regulation that we have in that entire
9	chapter.
10	There's nothing that we would be able to
11	enforce based on the way that this is written. And
12	even discussing this, Ann's discussions with the
13	Coast Guard is that when the Coast Guard issues the
14	permits, they don't even necessarily know that they
15	have issued a permit for an event that goes through
16	one of our speed zones.
17	So they're not even aware of the state
18	regulations that would be applicable. But in our own
19	regulation we've excepted ourselves out of enforcing
20	those based on the Coast Guard granting that permit.
21	We are in the process of trying to rework

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1	the exceptions and each of the exceptions included in
2	the PWC and the general boating to make it more
3	clear, to make a process if there is going to be a
4	process, much more clear and give the Department much
5	more control over what is and what is not being
6	excepted out. That is generally what would be.
7	MR. GRANT: There are two handouts go
8	ahead, Ann. I'm sorry.
9	MS. WILLIAMS: I wanted to add to that when
10	the Coast Guard gives two types of permits.
11	MR. GRANT: You have a handout pertaining
12	to that.
13	MS. WILLIAMS: The two permits are
14	permitted activity, and lets them do something, and
15	one is a no-permit-necessary letter.
16	In both of those letters they make a caveat
17	saying that they don't exempt you from any state,
18	local laws. So they're only saying you didn't get
19	any exemption, yet we gave them full exemption.
20	But the problem with their permit system
21	was when they got a no-permit needed, it was treated

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1	through enforcement as the same as a permit. So, for
2	example, something that we didn't know until we were
3	looking at this that Armour All had a request to do a
4	JetPack show, and the Coast Guard up in Baltimore
5	inside of a six knot zone, inside of a closed area,
6	gave them permission by a non-permit required permit
7	to do that show.
8	So everything we were talking about in
9	Ocean City happened in Baltimore, but nobody knew it
10	because they got a non-permit required form which
11	they thought gave them permission to do just this.
12	So that is why this is going into this
13	cycle of what does it mean, what are we going to give
14	them to do, and what is the process we are going to
15	go through to do that.
16	MR. GRANT: The single page with the
17	Maryland emblem at the top is a brief explanation of
18	the Coast Guard permit, non-permit letters. The
19	second two pages stapled together is just one page of
20	a long spreadsheet that the Coast Guard sends out
21	monthly to myself and NRP stating what has been

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1	requested, what is needed, what kind of coverage the
2	Coast Guard is going to offer for this.
3	The second page of that gives you the codes
4	pertaining to what kind of coverage they're going to
5	get. They're going to get a cutter, they're going to
6	get just a chase boat. Are they going to shut the
7	harbor down. What are they going to do. This is
8	what they get.
9	And NRP also gets this. This is NRP asked
10	to get for reviewing any kind of a permit request.
11	They didn't want to see the permit, they didn't want
12	to know who it was necessarily. They just wanted to
13	see this spreadsheet, and they would make their
14	determination as to whether they were going to
15	support it from this.
16	So if you have to get a little more
17	clearance on that and I think what is going to
18	happen well, I'm sure what is going to happen is
19	after the first of the year, after the dust settles
20	from the transition, we are going to try to get
21	together the OAG, and secretary NRP, and possibly the

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1	Coast Guard and decide how we are going to handle the
2	permit process, how much review is going to be
3	involved, who's going to cover what, and specifically
4	for JetPacks so we don't have Under Armour, is who it
5	was, doing all this stuff in the six knot zone.
6	THE CHAIRPERSON: John had a question.
7	MR. PEPE: Just for my own clarification, I
8	think I understand what you just went through. If
9	the Coast Guard issues a permit, DNR has no input
10	into it?
11	MR. GRANT: No, that is not true. The
12	Coast Guard says we will issue you this permit.
13	However, if you are going to do it here, you have to
14	realize there are local ordinances and you have to
15	observe them.
16	NRP will be notified by this form, this
17	permit, that this is happening. They have to look at
18	it and find it, and then they have to decide if they
19	are going to deal with it or not. Again, it doesn't
20	mean that you can have a poker run in a six knot
21	zone.

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1	MR. PEPE: So all local regulations apply?	
2	MR. GRANT: Absolutely. They do not	
3	supercede the Coast Guard permits do not supercede	
4	any local regulation. Any questions?	
5	MR. TALTY: Just one point for	
6	clarification. What Mike said is true. The way it	
7	is done now is they will issue a permit, and in that	
8	permit thing it will specifically state this permit	
9	that we are issuing you does not except you from any	
10	local law or ordinance.	
11	But the problem is the way in which the	
12	regulation is currently written, it is written if	
13	approved by the Department Natural Resources or the	
14	U.S. Coast Guard.	
15	So once they get the approval of U.S. Coast	
16	Guard, they fall into this exception which under this	
17	it says, this chapter does not apply to. So any one	
18	of those things, a permit issued by the Coast Guard	
19	for any one of those things, under the current	
20	regulation the way in which it is written would	
21	automatically take them out of that chapter.	

1	The restrictions that would apply within
2	that chapter no longer apply as a technical matter.
3	So that would mean that if NRP went into enforce a
4	particular provision and wrote a ticket, that
5	technically they could come back to us and say, well,
6	we got this permit from the Coast Guard, and under
7	your regulation it says if I get approved either from
8	DNR or the Coast Guard, I got it from the Coast
9	Guard, that doesn't put me in this chapter and,
10	therefore, I am not subject to these restrictions.
11	That is the issue that we are working on
12	revisiting and tightening up so that doesn't happen.
13	MR. GRANT: The last thing is Deep Creek
14	Lake Policy and Review Board had been notified of
15	this proposed regulation a while back. Bob advised,
16	because Bob Nickel is also on the review board.
17	MR. NICKEL: No, I'm not. I would say
18	liaison. No. I attend the meetings and give my
19	input, et cetera, but, no, I am not.
20	MR. GRANT: I stand corrected. I
21	apologize.

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1	They have some concerns over whether these
2	vessels would be a good idea at Deep Creek Lake.
3	Mark Talty is also their attorney as they are a
4	volunteer group for the state as well.
5	They're not sure whether it is going to
6	work up there. We have had some e-mails going back
7	and forth in the last 24 hours, which ultimately
8	means I am going to be going out there January 15 to
9	meet with them at their January meeting obviously,
10	and just kind of share what we know, where it's
11	going.
12	Ultimately, it's not going to happen this
13	year or at the earliest probably mid summer, but they
14	just need to be advised a little bit better. We'll
15	take care of that and hopefully that will settle
16	things.
17	They can do what they want pretty much out
18	there. They can recommend what they want, but if the
19	secretary accepts it or not is another story.
20	Anything else on JetPack? These are just
21	some housekeeping.

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1	The Caledon State Park change of name is
2	going through. That should be effective in February.
3	Sandy Point State Park this is what they
4	are going to get. This is the request that they
5	made. Basically the park and survey staff have
6	worked together on the specifics. The preliminary
7	surveys are complete, but they haven't tied all the
8	points to land yet. The final regulation will be
9	submitted in February.
10	THE CHAIRPERSON: Wait a minute. Go ahead,
11	Steve.
12	MR. KLING: Could you boat prohibited
13	area?
14	MR. GRANT: It hasn't been updated so I
15	apologize. What it means is you are going to have in
16	this area here no motorized vessels boating season.
17	Same up here. Six knot zone here.
18	MR. KLING: So we are going forward with
19	what we recommended?
20	MR. GRANT: Yes.
21	Finally, the speed limit updates, thanks to

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1	the hard work of Ann and Louis, 32 of the 40 zones
2	have been updated, and the online map will be up and
3	running after all have been completed.
4	If you have any questions for that they are
5	over there.
6	MR. PEPE: Mike, just a question to clarify
7	looking at that. That is going to be prohibited
8	boating season only, which is?
9	MR. GRANT: April 15 to October 15.
10	MR. HELLNER: What is the distance off the
11	shoreline?
12	MR. GRANT: Louis?
13	MR. WRIGHT: It is approximately 500 feet
14	offshore in that area.
15	THE SPEAKER: It's the length of the jetty.
16	THE SPEAKER: I am not familiar with the
17	jetty length, and being new I just wanted to get a
18	sense of what the distance was. About 500 feet.
19	THE CHAIRPERSON: So the maps are live.
20	Are going to go live shortly. Ann?
21	MS. WILLIAMS: The regulations have to be

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1	all completed, and once they get up-posted, the maps
2	will go live, because right now some of the
3	enhancements we are doing in the regulations are not
4	in reg but they are in map.
5	So we want to make sure that both of them
6	are in the same space and time when they're released,
7	but it will be before the boating season starts.
8	THE CHAIRPERSON: So you are thinking
9	before April?
10	MS. WILLIAMS: Oh, yes.
11	THE CHAIRPERSON: Thanks.
12	MR. GRANT: That's all I have.
13	THE CHAIRPERSON: So why don't we move on.
14	Is there any old business we want to address,
15	members? Anything? Steve?
16	MR. KLING: I apologize that the ad hoc
17	committee hasn't done anything. I've had an
18	annoying schedule for the last couple of months, but
19	we are going to have an ad hoc meeting of the ad hoc
20	committee in Lewes after this meeting to pin down
21	some times we can start to get to work.

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1	THE CHAIRPERSON: Thank you. Any other
2	old business? Any new business?
3	There is something I would like to do, and
4	I need your agreement to do this, so I would like to
5	actually send a letter to Secretary Gill thanking
6	him and Ann and everyone else who worked on these
7	maps for their really good work on the maps.
8	So I can read you the draft memo or a
9	letter or I can send it. I have copies and you all
10	can take a look at it. Since I am doing this on
11	behalf of the committee, I thought I should check
12	with the committee to make sure everybody is okay
13	with that. So let me pass it out.
14	I have to thank Bob for drafting this.
15	MR. PARLIN: I see most everybody has read
16	through the letter. As somebody who asked for this
17	about five years ago or so, I would like to make a
18	motion that we approve the letter be sent to the
19	secretary.
20	THE CHAIRPERSON: All those opposed? Oh,
21	it was seconded by Amy Craig. Any opposed? All

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1	those in favor?	
2	It was passed unanimously. I will	
3	finalize this and get it off on behalf of the	
4	committee to express our thanks for this innovative	
5	and important work that is being done by the DNR and	
6	Ann and by other folks on the staff. So thank you	
7	for that.	
8	Is there any other new business? Okay.	
9	So do I have a motion to adjourn?	
10	MR. DWYER: I make a motion we adjourn.	
11	THE CHAIRPERSON: Seconded by Bob	
12	Lunsford.	
13	All those in favor?	
14	(Members responded affirmatively.)	
15	THE CHAIRPERSON: We stand adjourned.	
16	Oh, I do that every time. The next	
17	meeting sorry, folks. What time frame do we	
18	normally have it, Jeannine?	
19	MS. MOANEY: May.	
20	MR. LUNSFORD: I think we are supposed to	
21	have one in March.	

1	THE CHAIRPERSON: So everybody take a look
2	at your calendars and let me know.
3	MR. LUNSFORD: I have to turn my phone
4	back on.
5	THE CHAIRPERSON: Yes, please turn your
6	phones on, folks.
7	MR. LUNSFORD: March?
8	THE CHAIRPERSON: Yes, March. So the 19th
9	or 26th, folks? Does that work for everybody,
10	either of those dates? The 19th is better?
11	MR. MARSH: March 26th is better for me.
12	I am out of town
13	THE CHAIRPERSON: So the 19th and 26th
14	have people unavailable. Is there some other date
15	in that month that would work?
16	How about other than a Thursday then since
17	people are out of town? Sometime the week of the
18	16th or the week of the 23rd?
19	MR. LEVITAN: Later in the month.
20	THE CHAIRPERSON: How about 23rd or 24th?
21	We can't have Captain Chris not here. How about the

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Yes? Yes? March 23rd, Al? Does that 1 23rd? Yes? 2 work for you, Fred? 3 MR. LEVITAN: Yes. 4 THE CHAIRPERSON: All right, let's make it the March 23rd, folks. Thank you for reminding me. 5 I will get it right probably at my last meeting as 6 7 Chair. Sorry. 8 It is a Monday. Monday, March 23rd. 9 Okay. Now I guess we really are adjourned. 10 MS. HENNINGER: Do you want to go ahead 11 and set the next one up, too, because it gets busy for those guys, I know, in boating season. 12 13 THE CHAIRPERSON: I think the next meeting 14 is not going to be until August, so there is plenty 15 of time after the March meeting. I think we can 16 wait. So what we are going to do is schedule the 17 August meeting at the March meeting. 18 So we are adjourned.
