

## Wildfires

The Maryland DNR Forest Service responds to an average of 660 wildfires that burn 3,600 acres annually. Nearly all wildfires in Maryland are started by people. Debris or open air burning is the leading wildfire cause in the state accounting for over 30% of wildfire starts.

## Open Burning Alternatives

- Recycle!
- Compost leaves and yard waste
- Many jurisdictions accept brush that is then ground into usable mulch
- Larger wood can be used as firewood

## Burning Tips

- Don't burn on windy days
- Have hand tools & water hose ready
- Never leave your fire unattended
- Burn at a safe distance from your house, shed, or other structures
- Check for additional local and state regulations

## COMAR 08.07.04 Forest Fire Protection

Authority: Natural Resources Article

§§5-209 and 5-604, Annotated Code of Maryland

### Definition

For the purpose of this regulation, Open Air Burning is defined as a fire where any material is burned in the open, except small recreational fires such as campfires.

### Application

This regulation applies to activities in woodland and within 200 feet of woodland, or activities adjacent to or within an area where flammable materials, that could ignite and carry fire to woodland, are located.

These regulations do not apply inside the limits of incorporated towns.

### Open Air Burning

A. A person may not engage in open air burning except under the following conditions:

(1) There is a natural or constructed fire break at least 10 feet wide completely around the material to be burned that is free of flammable materials;

(2) Adequate personnel and equipment are present to prevent the fire from escaping;

(3) At least one responsible person remains at the location of the fire until the last spark is out; and

(4) Burning occurs between the hours of 4 p.m. and 12 midnight E.S.T., except that when the ground is covered with snow the burning may occur at any time so long as all other requirements are met.

B. A person may engage in open air burning, or prescribed burning, which does not comply with §A of this regulation, if the person has submitted a plan for that burning to the Department for review and the Department has issued a permit for that burning. The Director, in his discretion, may require conditions in the permit which are more stringent or less stringent than the requirements in §A of this regulation.

C. In addition to the conditions and requirements in A and B of this regulation, a person engaged in open air burning shall comply with all other requirements of State and local jurisdictions.

### Burning Ban

Under prolonged or unusual conditions conducive to easy starting and spread of wildfire, the Director may declare a complete ban on all open air burning in woodland or in areas of flammable material likely to carry fire to woodland, through the state or in any specific area.

## 10 FIREWISE Tips for Homeowners

1. Address - Make sure your address is visible from the road, even at night.
2. Trees - Remove trees within 30 feet of building so that tree tops are at least 10 feet apart.
3. Roof - Clear the roof and gutters of leaves and other debris every fall.
4. Foundation - Trim grass and clear dead vegetation away from all buildings.
5. Decks - Clear out lumber and other flammable debris from under and around decks.
6. Firewood - Move the firewood pile at least 30 feet from buildings.
7. Access - Clear your driveway at least 12 feet wide by 14 feet high to allow emergency vehicles to reach your home.
8. Yard - Maintain a green lawn at least 30 feet around your house and outbuildings.
9. Tools - Put a hose on a rack and attach it to an outside faucet. Have a shovel and rake within easy access.
10. Prepare - Check your fire extinguishers. Discuss and practice a family emergency plan. Participate in your community's disaster mitigation planning.
